All SDA church employees' children had privileges to afford such education because of education assistance granted to them. After doing long literature review on factors that may affect physical, mental and spiritual growth among young people, the researcher realized that missing the means to afford Christian education and education at all hinders significantly those aspects of life. Yet within the Seventh-day Adventist church system, a large percentage of the tithes and offerings collected by its local congregations, are redistributed away from these same congregations, with only a small portion being returned in terms of staffing and support. This impacts on the ministry and mission the local congregation can provide. The Struggle for Resources shows that while the Seventh-day Adventist Church must remain a global movement, it cannot continue to do so at the expense of the local church. Steps have been taken in the right direction in terms of funding assistance for new church buildings, staffing-for-growth taking hold in some regions as well as the introduction of more flexible structures. But is this enough to restore the balance? Adventism, with its global mandate, must never forget that the local church is the church, and the stronger the local churches become, the stronger the entire body will be. Since its organization in 1863 the Seventh-day Adventist Church has been counter cultural. In its Christian witness to modern society it has advocated keeping the seventh-day Sabbath, vegetarianism, abstinence from tobacco and alcohol and refusal of its members to bear arms. But the stance on the refusal to bear arms has seen a metamorphous in modern times. Today more Seventh-day Adventist young people have voluntarily joined the military than in any previous generation of the Church's history. This volume is a compilation of essays that were presented at a conference called to discuss the Adventist Church's position on conscientious objection. For too long there was a dark secret in Adventism, but few liked to talk about it. Some of it seemed so dark and ugly, that it was swept under the rug. Ellen White talked about it in her letters, but not much is said. After fifteen years as a first-generation Seventh-day Adventist, I learned all about the "offshoots" as I was taken into their world. Talk of Jesuits and the Conference leaders as the enemies replaced talk of Satan - the real enemy. An us-versus-them dynamic took over, and strange conspiracies emerged. Few books have talked about the issue with offshoots. This has left church members perplexed when offshoots emerged. I had first heard of offshoots after being a baptized first-generation Seventh-day Adventist for over ten years. Once it happened, everything moved quickly. From hearing about a historic Seventh-day Adventist church popping up only a couple of miles from a conference church, to being given literature from conspiracy-theorist and ex-conference pastor Bill Hughes (The Secret Terrorists and the Enemy Unmasked), things began to become strange. I began to read and study both the Bible and the books of Ellen White to make sense of what I was being presented with. I interviewed pastors and talked with the leaders of offshoot churches, from End-Times-Prophecy.org to the pastor of a local offshoot, and began to put the pieces together. I realized that something was not right. After delving into the numerous websites of various offshoot ministries, some of which looked and sounded extreme, I started to realize that these movements were not of God. I wondered what the point of all this madness was. Was it to gain power, get rich, or to truly feel closer to the Lord? I realized that no two offshoots are the same, and only God Himself can judge the heart. Yet, looking at the various conspiracy theories that were rife in some offshoots, such as the Jesuit infiltration and mind control that conference SDA pastors were said to use, I knew that I was dealing with some strange ideas. Sadly, members of my own family had been duped into believing it, and for them, there was no turning back. I watched, in horror, as family grew depressed and militant. Stress replaced the joy of the Lord, and nothing that could be said would change their view on their new offshoot church. The local conference church was said to be deep in apostasy, numbered with Babylon. Could this be true? Why the animosity towards the church? The book would help to not only educate members but help them to know how to deal with the problem in a very realistic / practical way. The book would also appeal to members of the group to cease their activities and rejoin the church / "coming back on the platform". Journeys is a duet of sorts. The author will take you alternately on a nearly 12,000-mile motorcycle ride around the U. S. as well as an inside look at his own personal spiritual journey through six-plus decades of experiencing God. It began as a sabbatical project through his church in an attempt to find out what is happening in Seventh-day Adventist Churches across America. Why are some growing and most not? What is the degree of optimism among the pastors and the laity? How willing are we to embrace change in a church that looks strongly to its roots? As he began to put a plan in place Marvin quickly saw an opportunity to fulfill a life long dream of riding his motorcycle all around the country while digging out his research data. This adventure was a full year in planning, two months in carrying out, and another year in getting it into book form. Marvin believes that the information he found, while connecting with only one church that was not Seventh-day Adventist, is applicable to all churches in general.
